Over the past year and half Soldiers' Angels has been talking about the continued development of its music therapy program. With the launch of Soldiers' Angels Operation Harmony's Facebook page, things are now in full swing!

It all began in late 2007. While deployed to Kuwait, Sergeant First Class Kenneth Collins noticed that among his company were quite a few soldiers with musical talent. SFC Collins began to develop the idea of creating a garage band as a way to relief stress and maybe assist the Christians in the unit with their worship.

SFC Collins also happened to be in touch with Soldiers' Angels co-founder Jeff Bader. With Jeff's enthusiastic support and assistance, instruments



and equipment began flooding into Collins' unit. Soon "Praise in PT's," a Christian praise band was rockin' the house.

Since the beginning of Soldiers' Angels, founder Patti Patton-Bader had been sending all musical

in-



instrument requests to her husband Jeff, an amateur musician himself. In 2008, he delivered a guitar to a wounded warrior who immediately began to play it. Not long after, Jeff received a letter from the wife of the wounded warrior "who said her husband had bad TBI and couldn't even remember how to get home from his doctor appointments. But he was a guitar player and he remembered how to play a song from beginning to end. She said that playing that song gave him hope that he could heal, and sent him on the path of recovery."

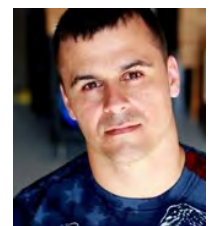
Dear Angels and Friends,

That touching note inspired Patti and Jeff to take things to the next level. They both wanted to make sure that the music therapy project would fit the mission of Soldiers' Angels—to assist in the recovery of our wounded warriors.—so they investigated carefully.

Soon Patti and Jeff joined forces with Yamaha Music & Wellness Institute to come up with a one-of-a-kind music therapy program. Operation Harmony is not only for wounded warriors, but for *all* veterans who would like to use music to soothe their souls and express what they are feeling.

Keeping in mind the challenges of veterans who are wounded, the program offers many options to injured heroes and other interested veterans. “Yamaha’s Clavanova’s (pianos) which we have at the Soldiers’ Angels Support Center can be played by amputees and those mentally challenged, or by anyone who doesn’t know how to play an instrument,” explains Jeff. “They also make a guitar product that is adapted to injuries, and we use harmonicas as well.”

Soldiers' Angels Operation Harmony has also handed out dozens of musical instruments to wounded warriors and veterans at several events.

Jeff he has seen the improvement in speech, short term memory and confidence that playing a musical instrument gives to our wounded warriors with PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) and/or a TBI (Traumatic Brain Injury). A special video featuring Op Harmony has been made and “you can visually see the confidence, joy and enthusiasm that are on the faces of our heroes in as they play,” Jeff says. One of the heroes featured in the video has found a musical goal that is motivating him: to learn a song to play for his wife on their wedding anniversary in September.

As Jeff says, “Music is well said to be the speech of Angels.” And now, thanks to Patti, Jeff and Yamaha, it’s the speech of Soldiers’ Angels as well.

Running with the Angels

Soldiers' Angels is hosting two Runs for Remembrance this September 10-11, 2011. All funds raised from the events will go to the work of Soldiers' Angels in support of military personnel, veterans and military families. If you are not a runner, you are invited volunteer to help a race and to donate in honor of the runners or an American hero of your choice.

In San Antonio, the Run for Remembrance takes the form of a relay race and ultra-marathon. Teams made up of nine runners will run a relay race (1 mile loop) for 9 hours and 11 minutes, or a single ultra-marathoner will run the duration (September 10-11).

In Shreveport, LA, the event will consist of the Soldiers' Angels 5K Run of Remembrance at Veterans Memorial Park. Participants are asked to bring donated items for care packages.

Steppin' for the Troops

Soldiers' Angel volunteer Amy Krome doesn't let a lifelong physical disability slow down her support for the troops. Running Amy's QRF, adopting soldiers, editing the [Soldiers' Angels Newsletter](#) and dozens of other things she does for America's heroes aren't enough for her--she's always on the lookout for new and creative ways to support the troops.

Amy's latest idea occurred to her while using [NuStep](#), a step machine that can be employed in a seated position. As she pressed herself to reach a higher and higher number of steps during each workout, Amy realized she could be within reach of 3000 steps a day, honoring the 31 Special Operations heroes who died in the helicopter shot down on August 6, 2011. In a creative twist, Amy has turned this into an ongoing fundraiser for Soldiers' Angels: *Steppin' for Heroes*.

Steppin' for Heroes is conducted in week-long increments, with donors stepping up to pledge based on how many steps Amy can complete

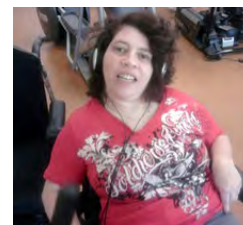
each day for that week. One *Steppin' for the Heroes* week is scheduled for each month. The first week will be August 30 to September 3.

Here's how you can be part of *Steppin' for Heroes* with Amy:

- Pledge that you will donate a specific amount to Soldiers' Angels every time Amy reaches at least 2,000 steps each day in a given week
- Challenge Amy by promising to double your pledge if she reaches 2500 steps or above on any day in the designated week

When news reports started coming in that 31 service members (all but one of them Special Operations personnel, most of them SEALs) had been killed in a single helicopter crash, a famous line in the presidential address that President Ronald Reagan gave the evening of the Challenger Space Shuttle Tragedy came to my mind: "We will never forget them nor the last time we saw them this morning as they prepared for their journey and waved goodbye and 'slipped the surly bonds of earth to touch the face of God."

In May of this year, President Obama announced to America and the world that an American Special Operations team—with the assistance of allies—had served "justice" to Osama Bin Laden for what happened September on 11, 2001. Americans world-wide and much of the rest of humanity let out a sigh of relief.

That sigh of relief was short-lived, because the war soon came back with a roar. On Saturday August 6, 2011, America lost 30 of the most amazing, courageous and selfless warriors, highly-

trained and experienced Special Operations heroes. Among those heroes were 22 members of the now-famous "SEAL Team 6," the team responsible for the raid on Bin Laden.

It was a sad reminder that not only does the "War of Terror" continue, but Special Operations warriors—along with every member of our

Armed Forces—continue to do their duty by placing themselves in harm's way to protect and defend our way of life... and in doing so, sacrifices are made!

America's Special Operations "take care of business," but all too many of them, because of the very nature of their jobs, go without the recognition they so richly deserve—they are the true unsung heroes!

In honoring those we lost, let us give all of America's Special Operations—past, present and future—the recognition they deserve!

Angels, please tip your wings in honor of our Special Operators!

To the 31 heroes killed on August 6: You will never be forgotten!

Congratulations to Bill!

Soldiers' Angels sends its warmest congratulations to William R. Hutton, longtime friend of Soldiers' Angels and new National Commander of the Military Order of the Purple Heart...

On August 13, 2011, William R. Hutton of Thousand Oaks, California was elected as National Commander of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, a national veteran service organization with more than 44,000 members.

Bill Hutton enlisted and served in the United States Marine Corps from 1965-1969 and was assigned to the Third Battalion, Fourth Marines, Third Marine Division during his tour of duty in Vietnam (1966). While serving in Vietnam, he was wounded three times with the last occurring on September 28, 1966 while leading his company up Hill 400, which was well fortified with North Vietnamese machine gun bunkers and had held off the Marine Company for two days. For his actions, Bill was awarded the Silver Star, Purple Heart medal with second star and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry. Hutton was honorably discharged from the Marine Corps as a Staff Sergeant (E-6) in 1969.

In April, 1969, Bill joined the ranks of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department where he served in every major division including narcotics for over thirty five years. In 1993, Bill was awarded the Medal for Bravery and the Distinguished Service Award for saving the life of a fellow deputy whose weapon had been taken in a struggle with a "Hell's Angel" motorcycle club member who was under the influence of heroin. Bill has been a member of the Military Order of the Purple Heart since 1997 and has held every leadership position in the Order up to and now

including, National Commander. Bill is most proud of his work as a Department Service Officer and his close relationship with the hard working National Service Officers who provide services to our veterans and their families through the National Service Program of the Military Order of the Purple Heart.

Hutton's goals during his tenure as Commander include improving all aspects of service to veterans and their families, expanding and improving the National Service Program of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, improving communications at all levels within the organization, and expanding the active involvement of local chapters and state departments in veteran support activities.

"Military Order of the Purple Heart of the U.S.A. Inc.," (MOPH) was formed in 1932 for the protection and mutual interest of all combat wounded veterans and active duty men and women who have received the decoration. Chartered by the Congress, The MOPH is unique among Veteran Service Organizations in that all its members were wounded in combat. With grants from the MOPH Service Foundation, the MOPH and its Ladies Auxiliary promote Patriotism, Fraternalism, and the Preservation of America's military history. Most importantly, through veteran service, they provide comfort and assistance to all Veterans and their families, especially those requiring claims assistance with the VA, those who are homeless, and those requiring employment assistance. Through the VAVS program, MOPH volunteers selflessly provide assistance to hospitalized veterans at VA medical facilities and State Veterans Homes.

Jammin' July

July was such a busy month that not all the July activities made it into last month's newsletter. For a few angels, July was certainly jam-packed...

Our Philly Angels took part in three different July events. In between it all, Local Soldiers' Angels Community Network Coordinator (CNC) Tammy Chappel met Mike, who is a part of a team assisting homeless veterans at the Erie Pennsylvania VA Hospital.

Tammy learned that during Pennsylvania's winters, Mike helps almost 300 vets. Together, they developed a partnership. "This year's goal was set at 125 vets to assist, and we even asked for extras if we could pull it off," Tammy says.

The plan is going well, Tammy reports. Between the SA warehouse sending 75 backpacks and Tammy and her fellow Angels working hard, they expect to have 75 backpacks filled by the end of September and another 75 for Mike in November.

Pennsylvania Angels met up twice at Hoss in Meadville, where they did a meet & greet and brought awareness to Soldiers' Angels. Tammy met up there with a former Angel that—to her surprise—found Tammy without even having the information she'd sent out to other Angels.

Along with Angel Christy Richardson, Tammy Chappel was brainstorming one day and came up with a great idea: collect "granny squares" to make Afghans for veterans. So, they logged onto Facebook and posted a few messages, asking their family and friends to donate a couple of granny squares. They truly were not sure what the response would be...

It succeeded beautifully! "Our first goal was to make an afghan for a wounded female soldier and one for a colonel at an Air Force base in CA, where a local Angel thought the colonel would enjoy it as a moral boost," Tammy reports. "Along the way, one of our Angels had finished a afghan and asked if we would take it as well. Sure

enough we did; we sent it to the colonel and kept going with the granny squares and decided to ship both afghans to wounded soldiers."

Tammy says, "Thanks to other Angels, we had an extra goal. Angel hugs to all whom helped."

In February of 2010, The Mystic Aquarium in Mystic, CT had picked Soldiers' Angels to be the recipient of their annual Fleece blanket drive with Angel Kim Wagner, but it didn't stop there.. Since then, Andrew and his team at the Mystic Aquarium Store have been very busy...

In a recent email, Andrew described what one particular employee has been doing: "Eleanor was responsible for collecting 75% of the donations we sent you! In the last three months alone, she has convinced 289 guests to donate a backpack to Soldiers' Angels! Needless to say, she is an extremely valuable asset to both our organization and to our partnership with you!"

July was certainly a jammed and jammin' month for Angels to celebrate America's Independence while finding unique and creative ways to bring smiles to our heroes and awareness to Soldiers' Angels.

"I got a notification that WeiEn had used my name in a comment. I went to see and noticed that Kat Thompson had changed her profile picture to this cute primitive angel doll and everyone was commenting on it and how they wanted one! They actually started saying, 'I want 2, or 3. I want to give one to....' and on and on they went. WeiEn said, 'I bet Lorri Robbins can make these,' so I answered. I said, 'Yes, I can!' Someone else also posted saying they could make them, too."

Angel Katlynn Thompson herself also uses her skills and talents in Alaska to help her support her soldiers. "I sell antiques in a rented booth in town," Katlynn explains. "This is how I get the money needed to do all the work I do for Soldiers' Angels and my other groups. She and I know each other from our online group for a platoon of Marines."

With Katlynn and Lorri's leadership, Alaska Angels have come up with an creative idea to help with Wrapped in Holiday Spirit. "I want to sell angels from now till Christmas," Katlynn says.

Soldiers' Angels is not involved with anyone selling magazines door-to-door, nor have we been in contact with a door-to-door magazine seller who has said they are donating a percentage of their sales to Soldiers' Angels or sending purchased magazines to the troops.

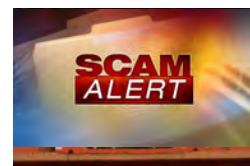
Individual companies may plan to donate to SA, but unless they have made formal arrangements with us, we cannot endorse their fundraising activities.

In general, if a company is working with Soldiers' Angels, information on their project will be found on www.soldiersangels.org. Just click

"Search" on the left side of the homepage and enter the name of the company or project to see if they are legit. If you ever have questions about a company, you can ask them for the name of their Soldiers' Angels contact or email angels@soldiersangels.org (sometimes local or small companies will make arrangements that don't appear on the website).

In current form, people are selling *Fit for Life* magazines that they say they are going to give to Soldiers' Angels to distribute to the troops.

This is a Fraud!



To avoid being scammed by someone claiming to work with Soldiers' Angels, check our site or email us to verify that they are legitimately supporting the troops through Soldiers' Angels.

For Standing Heroes, in Memory of a Fallen One

Angels in Virginia and West Virginia responded to SA's call to action last Memorial Day with a very special project in honor and memory of a Virginia Angel's husband, Sgt James McIlvaine, who was KIA on April 30, 2009 in Iraq.



The Soldiers' Angels Memorial Day-themed Fundraiser ran for a week, starting on Memorial day. Volunteers from both states met up at the Giant Food in Leesburg, VA to collect monetary donations and summer items to ship to a company of 200 soldiers deployed to Afghanistan. They also invited passersby to create or sign Memorial Day cards to be included in the packages.

The 2yr anniversary of that SGT McIlvaine making the ultimate sacrifice for our country fell on the first day of the fundraiser. What could be more appropriate?

"It was a very special and touching day," CNC Jacqueline says. "Our Angel who lost her husband surprisingly showed up with her two younger children after spending the morning with her husband's unit in Arlington, Virginia. They came to kindly donate items and to see and take pictures with the poster I made in honor of their husband/father. They couldn't stay long, as they were on their way to honor and celebrate the

life of a great Marine who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our country.

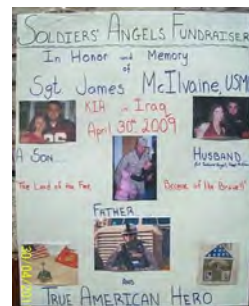
The team of Angels gathered over 715 items for care packages, with an estimated value of over \$2100. They collected an additional \$457 to cover shipping costs and gathered over 210 Memorial Day cards from Giant shoppers, which were included in the packages. In all, they sent 27 large boxes to their target unit.

"Hopefully these 200 servicemen and women will enjoy everything," Jacqueline says. "I know that our fellow Angels touched the hearts of many and made their deployments a little nicer. As for the Marine in memory and honor of whom we did fundraiser, we all know he would have wanted nothing more than for us to celebrate his life by helping his brothers and sisters overseas protecting our country... continuing his fight."

A Happy Cavalry—Thanks from the Front

Shortly after Mother’s Day, an Army company based in Texas deployed to Iraq. As they began to settle in for another long deployment, Staff Sergeant Wangsness realized that due to the announcement that their PX was closing soon and the fact that mail for them wasn’t too frequent, he should reach out to Soldiers’ Angels.

Wangsness and his unit were no stranger to the support given by the Angels of Soldiers’ Angels, having received it on their last deployment. So, it was the SSG’s hope that by reaching out to Soldiers’ Angels with the help his wife Dana and his Soldiers’ Angel, when the PX finally closed his Company would have enough supplies to last the duration of their deployment.

Amy’s QRF swung into action, posting a notice about the situation. Jacqueline Stein, Community Network Coordinator (CNC) for Virginia, Maryland and West Virginia, spotted the posting and offered to help. After connecting with Amy, she reported the situation on the VA State Blog:

Due to their isolated location in Iraq and the base PX closing as the military draws down, they cannot purchase their own supplies. They are in a terrible situation and desperately need hygiene items ASAP. The few things they have left are being stretched for the entire company.

Jacqueline added that she would be at a local grocery store and invited people to drop off items for SSG Wangsness there or at her home. She finished her announcement:

Thank you all for your help and generosity. It is greatly appreciated. In the spirit of this 4th of July weekend, what better time than now to help those who sacrifice all they have to give us our Independence and Freedom which certainly is NOT free...

Due to Jacqueline’s work schedule, all of the donations needed to be collected the week of Independence Day, so she threw herself into the project. “I spent all of Sunday (the 3rd) and early Monday morning (the 4th) making signs, responding to emails and phone calls etc,” she recalls.

In part because of the holiday, no one was able to assist Jacqueline at the last minute, so her mom decided to “sacrifice” her own Independence Day and help her daughter receive the donations. Aren’t mom’s the best? “My mother and I spent five hours on the 4th of July in 90+ degree weather

outside of Giant collecting monetary donations for shipping, and items for the unit,” Jacqueline recalls.

Though it was only a day’s notice, having the donation drive on America’s birthday just fit perfectly. After collecting all the donations, Jacqueline, her family, another Angel and her two sons as well as a neighbor, spent all day putting together care packages. The next Monday, Jacqueline took all 40 care packages to her local post office where she ran into a slight snafu: she realized that she was short on money for postage!

Accompanied by her little sister, a “Junior Angel,” Jacqueline went around her neighborhood asking for help, which brought in almost enough. Then another Angel heard Jacqueline was still a little short and covered the rest of the postage.

Jacqueline collected so much that she was able to send two additional big boxes of snacks and items specifically for females a few weeks later, including pictures and letters from some summer campers.

The packages to SSG W arrived in record time and he was thrilled, as was Jacqueline. “It all just happened so quickly,” she says. “The grace of God was definitely there and He obviously wanted us to help that company. I can’t think of any other way of how or why it became so successful in such a short period of time and went so smoothly. The heart and generosity of Americans really shined that week.”

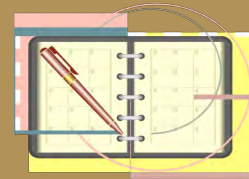
